

Subject: **Advisory for Prevention Against WhatsApp “Crash Codes” (Advisory No. 16)**

1. **Context.** “A new series of **text bombs** or ‘**crash codes**’ have been discovered that cause WhatsApp to continuously crash on both iPhone and Android handsets. Resultantly, victim is required to uninstall and reinstall WhatsApp, **potentially losing chat history.**

2. **Technical Details.** Crash codes or text bombs may execute in 2 ways: -

- a. Specially coded messages contain a **random string of strange characters** that cause WhatsApp to crash such as:-
- b. Undecipherable messages such as vCards (**virtual contact cards**) can also be used for this purpose. If a WhatsApp user opens the vcard, there might be 100 associated contacts and every contact has a **long weird name that contains a crash code.**
- c. Once the specially coded message or vcard is opened, the WhatsApp app will crash.
- d. Closing and restarting the app will not fix the issue, fresh WhatsApp installation would be required by the victim.
- e. Information about crash codes and vcards are available on online forums like **@WABetaInfo (Twitter).**

2. **Recommendations**

- a. In case such messages are received, WhatsApp users are advised **not to send them to friends, family or other contacts.**
- b. It is a good to **limit who can add you to a group** as this will help to **reduce the risk of being exposed to strangers** who might share a crash code or vCard.
- c. Open up your **WhatsApp settings**, go to ‘**Privacy**’ section and change the ‘**Groups**’ setting so that **only your contacts can add you to a group.**
- d. Anyone who receives a crash code message to “**log into his account in the web-based version of WhatsApp**” must **block the sender** and delete the message.
- e. WhatsApp users must keep their **WhatsApp app and mobile operating system up to date.**
